DEPARTMENT 1J DAIRY CATTLE

Regulations:

- 1. CATTLE MAY ARRIVE STARTING ON TUESDAY AFTER 4:00 PM AND MUST BE IN BY NO LATER THAN 8AM Wednesday MORNING. The exception is lactating dairy animals which may arrive any time before 10AM on Thursday. The dairy superintendent will start check-in at noon on Wednesday. In addition, all dairy cattle to be washed by noon on Wednesday and then maintained in a clean state along with the exhibit area from 8 a.m. to 9 p.m. throughout the fair.
- 2. All dairy exhibitors wishing to take part in the livestock auction or showing at State Fair must complete YQCA this year. Contact 4H office for further information.
- 3. Any dairy exhibitor is eligible for a chance to participate in the Dairy Products Sale (dairy basket). See regulations at the end of the dairy cattle department section. To be eligible to participate, each participant must fill out the Trempealeau County Dairy Basket Entry Form for their project animal. The dairy basket entry form is located on the Fair web site.
- 4. After completion of dairy show, all cows must be milked out.
- 5. All cattle will be judged on the Danish System.
- 6. Animals must be the result of regular project work. Project work must have been started before April 1 of the current year.
- 7. Only one animal per Class/Lot per exhibitor.
- 8. There is no limit to how many animals shown per exhibitor.
- 9. To exhibit in registered breed classes, the animal must meet breed requirements for show eligibility. For example, Holstein Association requires at least 87% on the registration paper. Any questions, please contact the dairy superintendent.
- 10. Bred and Owned registered animals shown must be registered in the exhibitor's name or immediate family name. Cows and yearlings must be registered as of July 25th of the current year.
- 11. Cattle must meet State of Wisconsin Health requirements. (Per county and district fair animal health regulations). If you have visual health concerns of the project animal, we recommend consulting with your veterinarian prior to bringing the animal to the fair.
- 12. Animals may be substituted WITHIN a Class/Lot, but NOT between Class/Lots. Example: If signed up for Class A, Lot 1 (2 yr. old Holstein cow), you may substitute with another 2 yr. Holstein cow.
- 13. All animals must have an identification number. All identification numbers MUST be included on fair entry form and matched with the animal prior to the animal being stalled at the fair. See ANIMAL HEALTH RULES. Registration papers will be checked on entry day at the Dairy Superintendent's desk.
- 14. Each club must have someone on barn duty from 8:AM. to 9:PM
- 15. All first and second blue ribbon animals must be brought into the During Show ring for selection of champions.
- 16. the fair it is the Individual Youth Exhibitors responsibility to prepare his/her exhibit for show/exhibition. No professional fitters are allowed. A given 4-H member may only be ASSISTED in this preparation by his/her 4-H/FFA project leader, and /or another Trempealeau Co. 4-H/FFA member(s) and /or immediate family members (parents, grandparents, aunts, uncles, legal guardian, siblings). The exhibitor must be present and actively involved with preparation of his/her exhibit at the time assistance is being provided.
- 17. There will be a pump and milking machine available in the dairy barn to use.
- 18. Animals entered in fitting and showmanship classes are to be

- shown by the exhibitor only. Since judging in fitting and showmanship classes is based on the member's ability to fit and show his/her animal to its best advantage, adult assistance may only be provided to secure and return a "run-away" animal to the exhibitor, with this assistance preferably being provided by show personnel.
- 19. Exhibitors must attend a Dairy Exhibitor Meeting on Thursday at 3:00 PM

Order of Show:

The Dairy Show will begin with milk cows, dry cows, and senior champions. Then there will be a Supreme Champion Cow and Reserve Supreme Champion Cow of the cow show. Next we will move into showmanship, beginning with Senior Showmanship, followed by Intermediate, Junior and Beginner Showmanship. Judging will then move to the heifer classes starting with Class G. Order of breeds will be alphabetical, beginning with Ayrshire. After all heifer classes are judged, we will then select Junior and Reserve Champion for each breed. Then, an Overall Supreme Champion Heifer and Reserve Supreme Champion Heifer will be selected. Then we will have the Roy Berge Award Class for selected participants, and conclude the show with the Dam & Daughter class.

Age Classifications:

- Spring calf born on March 1st or later and must be 3 months of age by fair time
- Winter calf born between Dec 1 and Feb. 28 of current year
- Fall calf born between Sept 1 and Nov. 30 of prior year
- Summer Yearling born between June 1 and Aug 31 prior year
- Spring Yearling born between Mar 1 and May 31 prior year
- Winter Yearling born between Dec 1 and Feb 28 of prior year (example for 2024 would be born between Dec. 1, 2022 and Feb 28, 2023)
- Fall Yearling born between Sept. 1 to Nov 30 (example for 2024: Sept. 1, 2022 to Nov 30, 2022) (fall yearlings that have freshened must show as two year olds)
- Two Year Old born between Sept 1 and Aug 21 (example for 2024: Sept. 1, 2021 to Aug 31, 2022)
- Three Year Old (example for 2024: born between Sept. 1, 2020 to Aug 31, 2021)
- Four Yr. Old (example for 2024: born between Sept. 1, 2019 to Aug. 31, 2020)
- Five Year Old and Older (example for 2024: born before September 1, 2019)
- Dry Cow 3 Years or over, and has milked 280 days or more since last calving

Dairy exhibitors will have the chance to auction off to the highest bidder a display basket filled with an attractive assortment of dairy products. There will be a limit of 10 dairy products baskets auctioned with the following eligibility requirements and auction details. Contact Sarah Burken at (608) 484-0897

- 1. Dairy exhibitors in the Junior Fair will be eligible for the sale. A maximum of ten exhibitors are allowed to sell dairy baskets. If more than 10 applications are received, first consideration will be given to first time participants with remaining entries to be determined by random draw.
- 2. Entries are limited to one per exhibitor with a dairy animal entry being a bona fide Junior Fair project animal.
- 3. Exhibitors will not be eligible to sell a cheese basket if selling an animal in the livestock auction.
- 4. Each eligible participant must submit the Trempealeau
 County Dairy Basket Entry Form found on the Trempealeau
 County Fair Website. Please see entry form for entry deadline.
 NO LATE ENTRIES.
- 5. A Dairy Committee member will contact exhibitors regarding entry eligibility.
- 6. Eligible participants will be expected to decorate and arrange a basket filled with an assortment of processed dairy products. Both the basket and dairy products will be provided to the exhibitor by the Dairy Committee. Dairy products baskets will be on display prior to the auction
- 7. Baskets must be at the livestock sale prior to the beginning of the

All dairy exhibitors wishing to take part in the dairy basket auction must complete YQCA this year. Contact 4H office for further information.

Guidelines for the Trempealeau County Livestock Project

Objectives of the Livestock Program:

Through participation in educational workshops and shows, youth will:

- A. Learn and apply practical livestock production, management and marketing practices.
- B. Have the opportunity to evaluate his/her educational experiences as they relate to livestock production.
- C. Be provided the opportunity to grow in the area of personal development, which encourages character building, including honesty, integrity, credibility, responsibility, resourcefulness and leadership skills.
- D. Be provided an opportunity to meet new people, share ideas and learn to work cooperatively with others.
- E. Have an increased awareness of career opportunities in the livestock/meat industry
- F. Be in a position to acquaint the public with the 4H and/or FFA programs and livestock industry as well as how high quality, wholesome meat animals are produced for the public.

Rules:

- A. Participants must be in good standing of Trempealeau County FFA, FHA, FLA, FCCLA, Skills USA, 4-H, or Scouts. Any other youth groups will have to petition in writing to the Trempealeau Agricultural Society on an annual basis.
- B. In all cases, questions or concerns regarding an exhibit are to be brought to the attention of the department Superintendent. The Superintendent can bring the question to the attention of the Livestock Projects Supervisor. If Superintendent or Livestock Projects Supervisor cannot be located, please come to the Fair office for assistance.
- C. Each exhibitor of a family may weigh in and register a maximum of 8 market beef, 8 barrows and/or 8 gilts, and/or 8 lambs, and/or 8 goats at the original weigh in for each family member entered in the livestock project. Animals can be registered under a family name for beef, sheep, goats, and swine. Only members of the immediate family may be included under the family registration. All eligible exhibitors' names must be listed on weigh in sheets at weigh ins. Selection of animals by exhibitor must be made prior to animal weigh in at the fair.
- D. All beef, swine, sheep, and goat market animals in the livestock project will be on the performance testing program. All market animals will be weighed in on the designated initial weigh in date and again on the final weigh in date entry day of the County Fair.
- E. Weighing procedures:
 - All beef, goats, and sheep will be weighed in on the initial weigh in date designated by the committee at specified places on scales operated by project leaders or other approved personnel. Swine must be ear notched at the initial weigh in. All sheep and goats brought to both weigh ins & the Fair must have a scrapies tag in the animal's ear.
 - 2) Length of performance testing will be approximately: Lambs 90 days, Beef 120 days, Goats 90 days.
- F. During the Fair, it is the individual youth exhibitor's responsibility to prepare his/her exhibit for show/exhibition.

No professional fitters are allowed. A given project member may only be ASSISTED in this preparation by his/her project leader, and/or another Trempealeau Co. project member(s) and/or immediate family members (parents, grandparents, aunts, uncles, legal guardian, siblings). The exhibitor must be present and actively involved with the preparation of his/her exhibit at the time assistance is being provided.

G. Identification:

- 1) Lambs, swine, goats, and beef by ear tag provided through the State Fair supplies, or through the Auction Committee if State Fair sources are inadequate. In case of lost tag, exhibitor MUST contact Nathan Ausen (608-484-0481) or email trempcac@outlook.com to obtain a new tag immediately. Animals unidentified at the fair will not be able to show or sell.
 - 2) Swine must be ear notched.
- H. Beef Market Animals at the Fair:
- 1) Beef Market Animals with horns longer than 2 inches from the hairline must be removed from the fairgrounds on entry day. Scurs, which are bony growth not securely attached to the skull, will be allowed.
- 2) Animals deemed uncontrollable and unsafe to exhibit will be dismissed from the show ring and/or fairgrounds. Show management reserves the right to warn the exhibitor or dismiss any animal deemed unsafe or uncontrollable at any time. No prize money will be awarded if an animals is dismissed and the animals is ineligible for sale at the livestock auction.

III) Carcass Show:

- A) All sale eligible animals will be ultra-sounded on Wednesday following weigh ins. The Auction Committee reserves the right to limit ultrasound scanning to one animal per species per exhibitor.
- B) Exhibitors showing in the Carcass Show must be at the show to receive a trophy, unless a written note or email explaining why they cannot be there is turned in to the Auction Committee chairperson by 7:00 p.m. Monday after the Fair. Emergency situations will be reviewed by the Auction/Livestock committee at that time.
- C) Those animals not sold in the auction will be trucked by the Trempealeau County Auction Committee truckers to the locker plants. Cost of trucking is to be paid to the Auction committee before noon on Sunday. These exhibitors are responsible for the animal's carcass and under wholesomeness of the Meat Product: All exhibitors and their parents or guardians must sign the market animal drug history form.
- D) Premiums are paid on 1 hog, 1 sheep, 1 goat, or 1 beef. If an exhibitor enters more than one sheep, one hog, one goat, or one beef in the carcass show, premium will be paid on the highest ranking animal only.
- E) Carcass contest does not count as an educational credit.

IV) Liability:

It is understood that all persons participating in this show, acting on behalf of themselves, their principals, their agents or employees, agree to make no claim against the "show," any official of the show or anyone acting by, for or through them or any of them, for loss, damage or injury to any property,

animal or person resulting from any cause. All animals, exhibits, grounds and buildings shall be under the entire control and management of the "show" but neither the "show" nor any of its officers or employees will in any case be held responsible for any loss or damage that may occur to any livestock exhibited. ALL LIVESTOK SHALL BE AT THE SOLE RISK AND RESPONSIBILITY OF THE EXHIBITOR.

V) Fraud:

The Trempealeau County Agricultural Society, Inc. reserves the right to withhold the premiums awarded in any case in which it shall appear that the regulations have not been complied with, or that fraud or deception has been practiced or attempted. Payment for beef, swine and lambs sold in the auction to local packing plants will not be made until carcasses have been inspected in the coolers. Any carcass showing evidence of ante mortem tampering will be paid for in accordance with their market worth, regardless of auction price of the live animal. Ribbons, medals and prizes awarded on such animals shall be forfeited and the exhibitor shall be banned from future showing.

VI) Wholesomeness of the Meat Product:

All exhibitors and their parents or guardians must sign a form prior to final weigh in attesting to proper withdrawal of all additives and injections administered to the animals being shown.

Auction Rules:

- 1. Participants must be in good standing of a youth organization approved by the Trempealeau County Ag Society (A complete list can be referenced on page 12) to be eligible to sell at the Trempealeau County Junior Livestock Auction. Any other youth groups will have to petition in writing to the Trempealeau County Agricultural Society on an annual basis.
- Exhibitors selling livestock (includes all species) at the Trempealeau County Fair Junior Livestock Auction can only sell at one county auction sale. Exhibitors selling livestock at the Trempealeau County Auction and another county auction will be barred from future auction sales at the Trempealeau County Fair.
- 3. Upon entering the fairgrounds, all animals will be checked in by the superintendent and penned. Animals will be weighed only once at the designated time for each species on Wednesday of the Fair. See Livestock Auction Committee President with questions.
- 4. All exhibitors must complete the animal destination form & turn it into the Auction Committee by 4 pm on Wednesday of the fair. Any changes to the animal destination after noon on Sunday of the fair will result in a \$25 fee charge.
- 5. Exhibitor must select which animal will be sold at the auction on the scale on weigh-in day.
- 6. Exhibitors will be limited to the sale of one entry only, excluding those that have multiple Grand/Reserve designations for beef/sheep/goats and Overall/Reserve Supreme designations for swine.
- 7. To be eligible for the sale animals must meet the following requirements:

- a. Animals will be graded during the live show
 - Steers & Heifers must weigh a minimum of 1000 pounds
 Dairy/Dairy Cross Steers (50% dairy) 1100 pounds
 - Miniature/Jersey minimum 850 pounds
 - 2) Hogs must weigh a minimum of 230 pounds. Max payout is 310 pounds
 - 3) Lambs must weigh a minimum of 110 pounds
 - 4) Goats must weigh a minimum of 50 pounds
- b. Must have all forms turned in by 8AM on Wednesday
- c. Digital pictures are due by July 1st, prior to the fair and emailed to trempcac@outlook.com
- d. Exhibitor and guardian must have attended mandatory rules meeting.
- e. Exhibitors will be charged a late fee of \$10 for each late submission of required materials.
- 8. All animals participating in the Carcass Contest must be shown at the fair.
- 9. All auction participants will pay to the Trempealeau County Junior Livestock Auction Committee a 10% commission on premium above market price with a minimum of \$40
- 10. All exhibitors selling animals in the auction must be present to sell their own animals. In the event of extenuating circumstances, absences must be approved by the auction executive committee.
- 11. The Trempealeau County Junior Livestock Auction Committee reserves the right to limit the sale to Blue and Red Ribbon winners.
- 12. The Grand and Reserve Champion animals that are otherwise qualified for the Auction have the right of late entry to the auction.
- 13. There must be a Grand and Reserve champion for the Auction Sale in all species. The judge must pick a sale champion if the show champion cannot or requests not to be sold.
- 14. If a buyer chooses premium, the animal remains responsibility of the exhibitor.
- 15. All exhibitors must care for and feed their animals until 4:00 pm on Sunday of the Fair. Exhibitor or exhibitor's family member must be present to help load out. Animals being hauled by the auction committee may be released by 3:00pm. Exhibitors not meeting this requirement will be assessed a \$20.00 load out fee. The feel will be taken from sale of animal. Halters will be returned if identified.
- 16. Animals not in the sale, but are trucked to the processor chosen by the Livestock Auction Committee, will be charged: Beef-\$20, Swine-\$10, Sheep-\$10, Goats-\$10 per animal. These fees must be paid to the Livestock Auction Committee by noon on Sunday of the Fair. In the event trucking is donated, the fees will be placed in the Livestock Committee general fund for facility maintenance.
- 17. All beef, swine, goats and lambs sold in the auction are inspected for evidence of tampering upon slaughter. Any animals not clearing inspection will forfeit payment, ribbons, medals and prizes.
- 18. All complaints must be made in writing by 5:00 pm on Friday of the fair.
- 19. Anyone who violated the rules as stated here could be barred from the sale.
- 20. Any questions, not provided for by these rules and

- interpretation of these rules, will be referred to the Auction Committee President and Livestock Project Supervisor. Their decision shall be final.
- 21. All exhibitors and parents are expected to assist with assembly and dismantling of the Auction Arena and clean-up of the pens at the end of the Auction & the fair.

Regulations:

- 1. Animals are to arrive on Tuesday of the fair BETWEEN 3:00 PM AND 9:00 PM
- 2. Exhibitor and guardian must review mandatory rules and complete required survey indicating compliance OR attend an in-person meeting. This information will be shared prior to the fair.
- 3. Identification numbers (see health rules) must be included on the fair entry form and matched by the superintendent with the animal before the animal can be stalled at the fair.
- 4. All exhibitors must be YQCA certified and have completed one additional educational event, and turned in a participation form to the auction committee by email at trempac@outlook.com prior to July 1st of that year.
- 5. All market animal weigh-ins will begin at 8:00 AM on Wednesday to determine classes.
- 6. All classes will be judged on the Danish System.
- 7. All animals must be the result of regular project work. Projects must have been declared by April 1 of the current year. Market animal entries must have been weighed and identified in the county program at the spring weigh in. Bred and Owned animals will be recognized during the live show.
- 8. Not more than one animal per Lot by exhibitor. A maximum of three animals per exhibitor in the market classes.
- 9. Exhibitor must have certificate of registration from appropriate breed association. Must be presented on entry for breeding stock and non-dairy/crossbred Market Animals. All Market Heifers will show together.
- 10. Exhibitors must provide their own feed and bedding, and all beef animals must be housed in the beef barn. All beef animals must be housed in the assigned stalling space.
- 11. In breeds with less than four animals shown, the judge will decide if any exhibitor is deserving of the Champion and Reserve Award.
- 12. All market animals must be born on or after January of the previous year.
- 13. Market animals will be divided into weight lots to be determined after the animals have been weighed on entry day. If two animals fall into the same weight lot, one animal will be bumped into the next highest weight lot. The exhibitor will choose which animal is to be bumped. If two animals fall into the heavy weight class, both animals can be shown.
- 14. Animals bred and owned by the exhibitor. An animal qualifies for the award if the dam of the animal is owned by the family and the family paid for the breeding of the dam. Each animal qualifying as Bred and Owned will be recognized.
- 15. You must sign up on your fair entry form to participate in showmanship which will be held at the end of the live judging.
- 16. Animals can only be entered in one lot. AN ANIMAL CAN ONLY BE ENTERED IN EITHER A BREEDING CLASS OR A MARKET CLASS, NOT BOTH.

17. There will be an open Beef show immediately following the conclusion of the junior show. Animals that are shown in the Junior Show are not eligible to be shown in the open show.

Sunday, July 21, 2024 at 9:00 a.m. – Farm Progress Arena Rules:

- 1. The following departments will participate in the Round Robin: Dairy, Beef, Swine, Sheep, Goats
- 2. Each species representative will be the winner of the respective senior showmanship class
- If a winner from one of the showmanship classes chooses not to participate in the Round Robin, the option to participate will default to the second place winner in that class.
- If a member is eligible to participate in the Round Robin in more than one species, they must choose the species in which they will participate within one hour of winning the second species contest. The member must inform the Round Robin Coordinator (Jamie and/or Shylana Goplin) of their decision. The second place winner in their non-chosen species will have the option to participate.
- All youth, excluding those who have previously been named Round Robin Champion, are eligible to participate in the Round Robin Contest.
- 3. Each judge will use the same scorecard to evaluate each participant in the following categories: Animal & Equipment, Showing the Animal, Species Knowledge and Appearance/Attitude.
- 4. If items such as a brush, show stick, comb, etc. are necessary to show your species, they will be provided with the animal.
- 5. Each participant should wear the appropriate attire for the species they are representing.
- 6. Prizes will be awarded.
- 7. All Round Robin participants will meet in the Farm Progress Arena at 8:45 a.m. on Sunday to review the rules.
- 8. In case of a tie, the judges will confer and break the tie.

DEPARTMENT 6J HORSE AND PONY

- All horse project exhibitors must meet their club's requirements and be in good standing with the Trempealeau County 4-H Horse project to qualify for the Trempealeau County Fair show. Bylaws can be found on the Trempealeau County 4-H website.
- 2. All horses/ponies must be identified by April 1 with horse ID sheet to show at the fair. Premise ID number must be included on this form.
- 3. No exhibitor may enter more than three head in the Horse Project. No more than one animal in any lot. Mare and Foal are considered one animal.
 - No Stallion born prior to January of current year may be shown.
 - All ponies must be measured prior to or at check-in. Any

- animal over 56" must be entered in Horse Classes. Ponies may enter horse classes upon exhibitor request.
- 4. Lots with less than five horses may be combined.
- 5. An animal shown in more than one showmanship or equitation class may only receive a premium in one of the classes, except when shown by a member of the same immediate family, or horseless horse member.
- 6. An animal may receive a premium in only one of the following classes: pleasure riding or driving, halter, trail, obstacle driving or gymkhana pleasure.
- 7. All competitors earning a blue or red ribbon are eligible for the stated championship classes and are to return to the ring at the completion of the classes for competition. Novice entries are not eligible to compete in championship classes.
- 8. Except for show times, horses are to be ridden only in designated areas.. Horses must have a minimum of a halter and lead rope when not stalled.
- 9. Exhibitors showing horses in gymkhana classes have the option of showing said horse in gymkhana pleasure or regular pleasure classes. Once you enter this lot in the pleasure category, you must stay within this category with said horse. These classes offer no berths to the District competitions. Gymkhana horses may be ridden in gymkhana classes with approved gymkhana equipment. Leg coverings are prohibited.
- 10. The minimum attire for showing at the Trempealeau County Fair will be: Western: a long sleeved, collared Western shirt, jeans, boots and helmet. English: Appropriate jacket, breeches, boots, and helmet. You are allowed to go above these guidelines.
- 11. All riding classes are walk-trot-canter classes, unless stated in class title.
- 12. Exhibitors must indicate on ID sheets and Trempealeau County Fair entry forms, horse "A" as your primary horse, and a "B" for your second horse and "C" for your third non-premium horse. All lots that you enter your horse "C" into shall be non-premium and ribbon/trophy only, unless replacing horse "A" or "B" at fair show. These letters need to accompany all registrations for classes to identify which horse is being exhibited in which class. This is a requirement for proper premium disbursement.
- 13. A junior (5 years or under) horse/pony can show in a snaffle bit (no shanks) or bosal and must be ridden with both hands-on reins.
- 14. Mules may be shown in all classes.
- 15. Novice classes are open to any exhibitor showing at their first 3 fairs and who has not previously won a blue in stated class. These classes do not qualify for champ classes, nor is a premium paid. Individuals showing in a Novice class can also show in their age division.
- 16. Two (2) minute gate rule will be enforced. Clock will start when the first horse enters the ring. The gate will be closed two (2) minutes after first horse enters.
- 17. Gymkhana High Point Awards will be awarded to Pony (grades 3-13), Beginner (grades 3-5), Junior (grades 6-8), and Senior (grades 9-13). Points will be awarded based on horse & rider combination & by the number of entries on the following basis.

On the Judge's order to "finish your dogs" handlers will simultaneously finish their dogs. The Team Captain will advise the judge as to which dog will be called first. Individual scores will be added together to get the team score.

- Judging will include general appearance and condition, temperament and proper handling, hair, coat, paws, nails and body build.
- Cats must have either a harness, or a collar and leash on when being judged.
- Cat cage decoration theme for 2024 is "Favorite Food."

 If cages are being decorated, cage decorations must be in place by 9AM and remain in place until the end of the Cat Show. An Award of Excellence will be awarded for the Best Cat Cage Decoration.

- 5. Attach a note card explaining mixed media used, if applicable. Examples are crayon, watercolor, etc.
- 6. Entry tags should hang over the upper right hand corner of the item by using a string attached to the back side of the item. Indicate on the tag how many years exhibitor in the drawing/painting project.
- 7. No coloring sheets may be entered in drawing/painting. All work must be original to the artist.
- 8. Definitions:
 - Mixed media is two or more DIFFERENT art mediums used on one art piece. Ex: Drawing: Colored pencil and ink. Painting: acrylic paint and watercolor. unless specified in the combination mixed media classes and may combine drawing & painting mediums
 - Scratch Art: A commercial product, art is on a scratchboard which is a black ink covered board that specific metal drawing tools are used to remove the ink to show a white, colored or metallic board underneath. Must be exhibitors original drawing to be scratched, NOT a preprinted kit.

<u>Regulations for ALL Food Revue entries (showmanship, projects, decorating & candy):</u>

- 1. Creative presentation of food including place-setting, menu and recipe cards. Older youth have additional requirements.
- 2. All exhibits must be the result of project work for the current year.
- 3. Exhibitor must complete a Reflect & Write sheet for each entry. Please bring with projects exhibiting. See 4-H newsletters for form.
- 4. All participants must be enrolled in food, nutrition, cake decorating or similarly-named projects within their youth organization.
- 5. Youth MUST set up and clear their own exhibits. Parents, leaders, or other adults may give advice prior to entering the exhibit hall, but once inside, youth must do ALL the work of setting up their displays.
- 6. Displays must remain in place until the end of the Foods Revue.
- 7. Doors open 30 minutes prior to judging. Participants not set up and/or projects not in place by the posted starting time, and any exhibit not meeting the regulations may be rejected or downgraded at least one level.
- Recipients of Award of Excellence ribbons at the Foods Revue MUST exhibit the winning display/item WITH RIBBONS at the Trempealeau. Co Fair in July or make arrangements for set up and take down. Use the following schedule: Tuesday night OR Wednesday morning of the Fair BEFORE 9am.
 Showmanship and Activity winners – Showmanship winners bring everything except the food. Project winners bring entire display OR a photo board.
- 8. Foods Revue registration forms must be turned in to the Trempealeau County Extension Office. Refer to 4-H newsletter.
- 9. To receive premiums, participants in any Food Revue class MUST fill out and return a FairEntry Form at fair time & use the Class and Lot numbers found in the Fair book
- 10. The Danish judging system will be used.
- 11. Questions or concerns: contact Sarah Sagler at 608-484-2288.

Regulations for ALL showmanship entries

- 1. Exhibitors may bring <u>one</u> entry from Lots 1-6 and one entry from Lots 7-14.
- 2. Exhibitors must be present with exhibits for face-to-face judging.
- 3. Recipes and menu cards should be exhibited on paper or cards of your choice to enhance your overall theme. They may be hand-written or typed. Paper may be no larger than 9x12 inches.

Regulations for Lots 1-6

- 1. Only one (1) serving of each food will be required of each requested food in each lot. Consider what a "normal" serving size would be for a particular food item.
- 2. Recipes must be complete (specific ingredients, procedures, servings and recipe source).
- 3. Place settings should be for one individual.
- 4. Prepare the table setting and centerpiece (if required); display the completed food with menu and recipe cards. These should be as attractive and complimentary to the theme as possible.
- 5. Participants must set up their own entries or be downgraded one premium level. Parents, leaders, or other adults may give advice prior to entering the exhibit hall, but once inside, youth must to ALL the work setting up their displays.
- 6. The menu chosen should contain at least one-third of the

- nutrients needed daily (except for Lot 1).
- 7. The day of the show, prepare the food at home. Hot foods can be held at room temperature a maximum of two hours OR kept hot at the show by using a slow-cooker, roaster or frying pan OR an insulated container.
- 8. Be prepared to answer nutritional questions concerning how your meal or snack fits into the My Plate and the US Dietary Guidelines for Americans and your reasons for planning your menu (color, texture, cost, etc.)
- 9. All exhibits must complete a Reflect & Write sheet for each entry. *Check out the info on the web at Trempealeau.uwex.edu. Then click on the 4H Youth Development tab, then hover over the 4H Foods Revue link.

Regulations for Lots 3 - 6

This year's theme in Showmanship will revolve around any holiday or celebration event. For each age for your chosen theme and dietary requirements. Reminder – creative presentation of foods including table cover and/or place mat, place setting and recipe cards (pages) and more requirements as age/lot increases. Holiday or celebration should be explained or clear to judge by use of coordinating decorations. Lot

- 1. Ages 5-8: "Winter" themed Snack. Include the snack prepared by exhibitor, recipe, a table cover &/or place mat and a place setting for one. No centerpiece required. This should be a snack the youth has enjoyed preparing several times with little or no help. Refer back to the regulations for further info.
- 2. Ages 9-10: "Fall" themed Appetizer. Include appetizer prepared by exhibitor, the recipe, table cover &/or place-mat and a place setting for one. No centerpiece or menu card required. Refer back to the regulations for further info.
- 3. Ages 11-12: "Summer" themed Lunch. One main dish and one side dish prepared by exhibitor. Include a table cover &/or place-mat and centerpiece along with menu and recipe cards. Refer back to the regulations for further info.
- 4. Ages 13-14: "Spring" themed Dinner, one main dish and one side dish and drink prepared by exhibitor. Include a table cover &/or place-mat and centerpiece along with menu and recipe cards. Refer back to the regulations for further info.
- 5. Ages 15-16: "Fall" themed Meal. One main dish, 2 side dishes and drink prepared by exhibitor. Include a table cover &/or place-mat and centerpiece along with menu and recipe cards. Refer back to the regulations for further info.
- 6. Ages 17-19: "Any Season" plus. *Challenge-Create an informational 3X5 card that explains/explores the history of one of your food items prepared. One main dish, two other food sides and drink prepared by the exhibitor. Include a table cover and centerpiece along with menu and recipe cards. Refer back to the regulations for further info.

CLASS A-FOOD REVUE~FOOD OR NUTRITION PROJECT

<u>Regulations for Lots 7 – 14 FOOD OR NUTRITION PROJECT:</u>

DEPARTMENT 25J FOOD & NUTRITION

- 2. All products must be made from scratch unless otherwise specified. Do not use topping or frosting on baked goods unless it is a part of the product.
- 3. All lots (cookies, snacks, cakes, biscuits, muffins, breads, pasta, pastry, microwave, candy) MUST include a recipe specifying title, ingredients, directions, cooking temp and time, serving size and recipe source. NOTE THE specific SOURCE (family member's name, website name, cookbook name, magazine name, etc.)
- 4. Do NOT insert recipe card into plastic sleeve or baggie. The recipe card should be attached to the entry tag in such a way that the back of the tag is available for the judge's comments (string or rubber band).
- 5. Recipes may be used from any source (traditional, family, cookbook, newspaper, internet, etc.), however, they should conform to the TRADITIONAL nature of the product (example: peanut butter cookies traditionally have a criss cross pattern on the top).
- 6. Frozen products MUST be completely thawed when brought to the judge. Indicate to the judge that items have been frozen.
- 7. No food product, including muffins, will be accepted if exhibited in paper liners, unless otherwise specified.
- 8. **Breads: Bake in any size pan, but bring full loaf and cut off small part of loaf in front of Superintendent at the Fair.
- 9. Cakes are to be exhibited right side up.

- 2. Departments 101-128 are open to any individual without regard to race, color, creed, sexual orientation, ethnic background or economic opportunity.
- 3. All entries must be submitted on regular County Fair entry blanks to the Trempealeau County Fair Entries, PO Box 206 and postmarked <u>no later than June 10th</u> or exhibitor will be disqualified. Online entries deadline is June 20th. <u>All entry fees must</u> be paid or postmarked by June 20th or will be considered a late entry. All payments after June 20th will be charged a \$20 late entry fee.
- 4. **All items exhibited must have been made or grown by exhibitor since the last Fair, or in the case of antiques, owned by exhibitor. Items exhibited by any person in any previous year, junior or open class department, cannot be exhibited again by any person.
- 5. Open Class doors will open at 8 a.m., and everything must be in place by 9 a.m. on entry day or exhibit will be disqualified.
- 6. Open Class exhibitors must pay an entry fee of \$10.00. For animal exhibitors there is also a \$1.50 per animal stall fee which is non-refundable. Small poultry/animal exhibitors must pay a 50¢ cage fee per poultry/animal.
- 7. Each exhibitor is limited to only one entry per lot number. There will be a maximum of one placing each of 1st through 4th in each lot.
- 8. All entries are exhibited at owner's risk. The Trempealeau County Fair will take reasonable precaution but will not be responsible for damages, losses or thefts.
- 9. Superintendents will be on hand to take in articles and see that they are placed in correct categories for judging according to numbers on the exhibits entry tag. They will not be responsible for items entered in wrong classes.
- 10. Superintendents have the privilege of rejecting any items not meeting the requirements.
- 11. No entry can be removed before 4 P.M. on the Sunday of the

- Fair or forfeiture of premium will result. Superintendents will give out items at the end of the Fair. All entries are to be picked up by 5:00 p.m. Fair Society and Superintendents are not responsible for exhibits not picked up by 5:00 p.m.
- 12. An Award of Excellence ribbon will be awarded in all departments when the Judge feels an article warrants same. There is no prize money awarded these ribbons. No exhibitor will be paid more than one premium under any one premium number.
- 13. In all cases, questions or concerns regarding an exhibit are to be brought to the attention of the department Superintendent to be handled. The Superintendent can bring the question, if needed, to the attention of the Trempealeau County Ag. Society for further review. If the Superintendent cannot be located, please come to the Fair office for assistance.

ATTENTION: EXHIBITORS WHO PLAN ON TYING THEIR ANIMALS WITH THE JUNIOR FAIR CATTLE MUST NOTIFY THE JUNIOR FAIR SUPERINTENDENT OF THEIR INTENTION.

Regulations:

- 1. OPEN CLASS ARE TO ARRIVE ON WEDNESDAY LACTATING DAIRY MUST ARRIVE NO LATER THAN 10AM ON THURSDAY.
- 2. All animals must comply with the Animal Health Rules & Regulations as described in this fair premium book.
- Only registered and purebred grade animals are eligible for this show. Any questions arising as to the breed of an entered animal will be at the discretion of the Superintendent for possible placement in the crossbred class.
- 4. The Junior & Open Dairy Show will be combining classes for the heifer & cow shows. Champion classes will still be held separate. Please note, class standings will still be recognized independently for both shows.
- 5. Registered animals entered in the Junior show can exhibit in the open class show, <u>but **should not**</u> be entered in the open class show.
- 6. Open class dairy is open to exhibitors outside of Trempealeau County. Non-Trempealeau County exhibitor fee will be \$10.00, and the Trempealeau County resident exhibitor fee will be \$10.00. Stall fees of \$1.50/animal will apply to both Trempealeau Countyand non-Trempealeau County exhibitors.
- 7. All first and second placed animals go in for the champion class.
- 8. A \$1.50 per animal stall fee is charged in addition to the \$10.00 entry fee for Trempealeau County resident exhibitors, or \$10.00 entry fee for non-Trempealeau County resident. The fees are due with all entries and are nonrefundable.
- 9. Animals may be substituted **WITHIN** a Class/Lot, but **NOT** between Class/Lots. Example: If you sign up for Class A, Lot 1 (2 yr. old Holstein cow), you may substitute
